rector of and principal of Moreland School, has informed the School Board that basketball courts will be made available on all school playgrounds as soon as the weather permits.

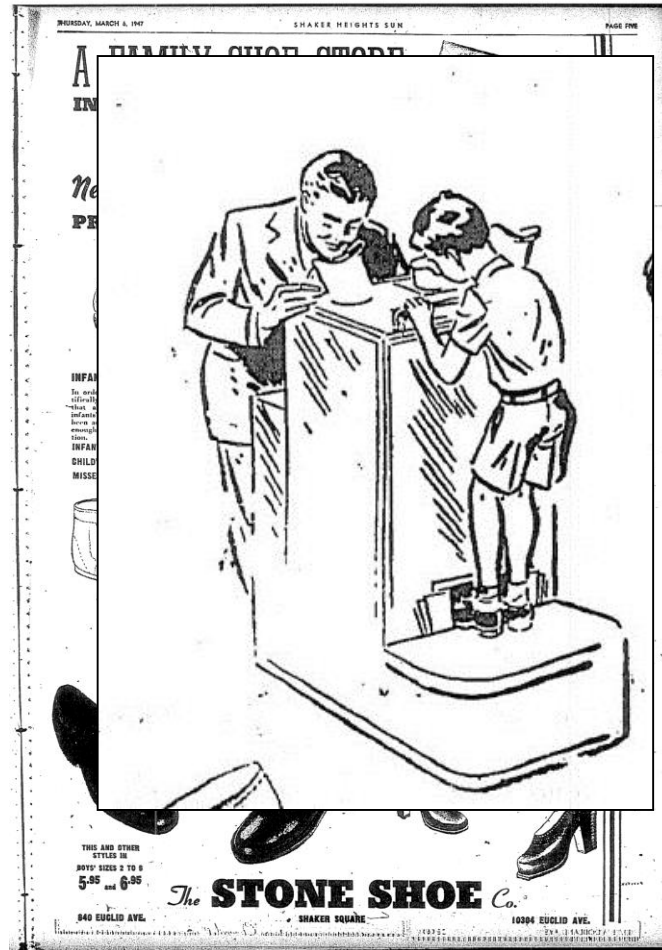
Cooperation has also been promised by the physical education instructors of the boys and girls in all the elementary schools as well as at the Junior High School.

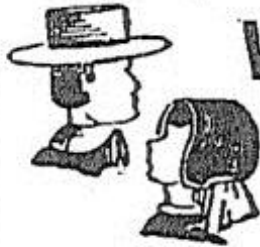

Shaker Rapid Transit Escalator to Begin Operating Monday

By Jane Artale

Mayor William J. Van Aken announced today that the Shaker Rapid Transit's electric stairway, the innocent victim of strikes and shortages for the past year, has finally been completed and will go into operation at 8 p. m., Monday.

To find out how well the electric stairway works, I took a trial ride yesterday on Paul K. Jones' \$60,000 "stairway to heaven." For a footsore commuter, it was like a long, cool drink on a hot July day.

This Monday, the Shaker Rapid's 28,000 riders will get the same kick out of riding the slick, chromium stairway that I did. Under construction for more than a year, the escalator will make the end of the rapid ride at the Terminal a pleasant affair rather than a stair-climbing ordeal.

Though Shaker's Rapid Transit is tops in transportation, the long climb at the end of the ride has always been a distinctly unhappy ending. Hurried commuters have elbowed weary shoppers

in the throngs that jammed through the turnstiles to the stairways. Now all that is changed.

I rode a swift and comfortable car to the Terminal where I alighted and headed for the new electric stairway installed by Westinghouse. Two stream-lined "electric eye" doors opened magically as I approached, a welcome change from the necessary shoulder-pushing needed to manipulate the swinging doors barring the old stairway.



Here's 8 Rules To Fight Polio

Mrs. Mary K. Porter, nurse of the Shaker health department, reported today that Shaker Heights and surrounding area have been free of polio to date this year.

She urged the following precautions and instructions for children and their parents as well, inasmuch as polio has been striking with greater frequency among adults.

1. Avoid new contacts. Try not to mingle with crowds unnecessarily. (Schools and other gathering places, however, may remain open.)

2. Don't get overtired as extreme fatigue makes you an easier victim; avoid chills and don't stay too long in cold water; keep clean, wash hands before eating, keep flies and other insects away from food.

3. Help keep your community clean, waste and exposed garbage may be sources of infections.

4. Don't swim in polluted waters.

5. Avoid removal of tonsils or adenoids prior to and during polio epidemic season.

6. Watch for headache, unexplained fever, a cold, even upset stomach as the first symptoms of infantile paralysis.

7. Call your doctor immediately if any of these symptoms appear. Expert medical care may help prevent crippling.

8. Don't worry about expense. If polio strikes, get in with available care and Chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

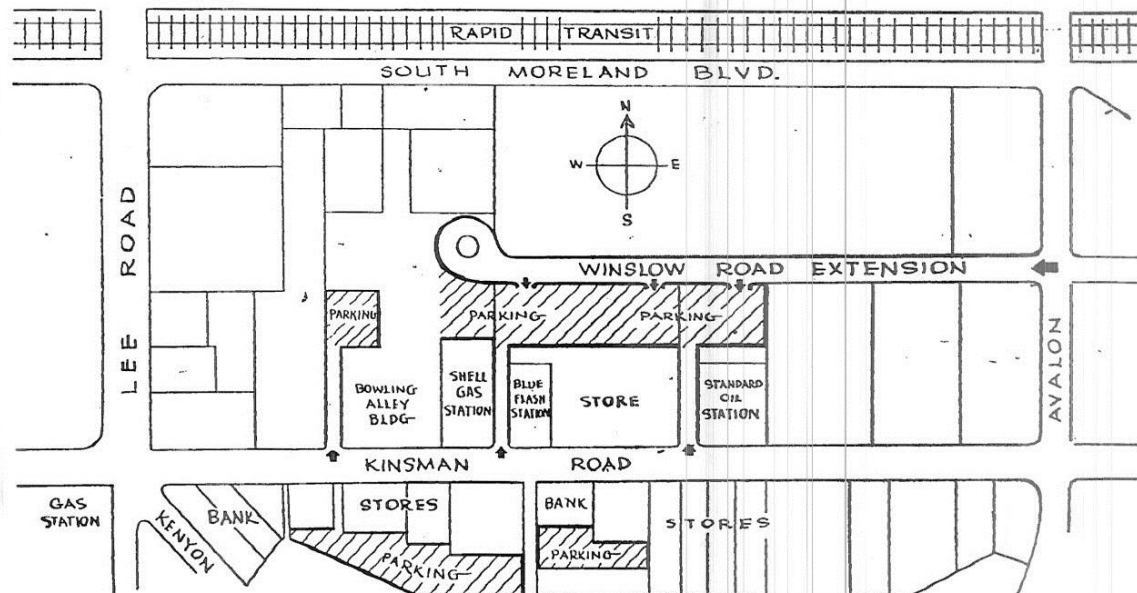

Shaker's Thornton, Baby Sitter for 4,395 Tots

The cheapest "baby sitting" in the country—and the best, that's what they've nicknamed the Shaker Heights playground program. And Clifton Webb is a small-timer compared to Charlie Thornton.

And as proof of the pudding is in the eating, so too are the sky-rocketing attendance records at the city play spots, proof positive of their growing popularity. The Shaker playgrounds, ably staffed and crammed check-full with fun events, are the perfect vacation at home for tots.

Thornton, director of recreation, in his preliminary recreation report, showed that 4,395 Shaker youngsters enrolled in the program during one week alone. This is nearly 1000 more children who attended during the third week of the program last year.

Financial comparisons show that \$1,875 was collected from the \$2 weekly fee in the third week, as against \$1,621 a year ago. Average daily attendance at the eight play-spots has been 840, Thornton said. As there are 60 regular supervisors

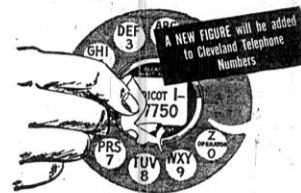

west with his feats as a freshman at Stanford. The Tulare, Calif. flash owes much of his track prowess to the efforts of Rice. He was track coach and line coach of the football team at Kiski.

Rice will hold a similar post at Shaker.

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Shaker Heights Began to Look at Using Radar

SHAKER CONSIDERS USE OF RADAR CAR AGAINST SPEEDERS

Thomas E. Walker, Shaker's police chief, said today that Shaker Heights was seriously considering the installation of radar on one of its cruisers to use against speeders in the suburb.

Walker and Lieut. Bernard F. Dowling, head of Shaker's traffic bureau, have been working with Cleveland Heights police this past week to learn how radar functions against speeders.

Cleveland Heights began using radar against speeders with good results about six months ago.

From his observation, Walker said radar would be effective on residential streets where clocking speeders in an actual chase is difficult.

Through radar, a control vehicle could clock speeders as they passed and radio ahead to a second car to flag down the speeders and present the tickets. The 1951 Shaker budget has \$750 earmarked for the purchase of radar equipment.

\$325,000 LIBRARY IN SHAKER HEIGHTS WILL OPEN JAN. 3

Shaker's new library will open at noon, Jan. 3 and Miss Virginia Robinson, head librarian, and staff will greet visitors at an open house until 9 p.m.

The two-story brick colonial buildings is at 3450 Lee Rd., just north of the present rented quarters at 3488 Lee Rd. at Kinsman Rd. The present library will close Dec. 26 to facilitate the move.

The library, begun 15 months ago and delayed in recent weeks by material shortages, will cost approximately \$325,000. The land on which it is situated cost an additional \$15,000.

Taxpayers in the Shaker school district approved a \$350,000 bond issue for the new library in No-

The new library will be air-con-

ditioned. It will have a full basement, elevator service from the basement, and toilet facilities there.

The first floor includes a children's room, a reference room, and a large general reading room lined with books. The reference room is named for the late Ellen Ewing, head librarian who died in the S.S. Noronic fire.

On the second floor, there will be a storage room, a book repair room, a meeting room for the library board, a staff room, and a room furnished by the Shaker Heights Historical Society through funds of the will of the late Bertram Woods.

Architects were C. B. Rowley and Associates. Lewis and Son of South Euclid were general contractors.

David Dietz, science writer for the Cleveland Press, is head of the library board.

SHAKER HEIGHTS COUNCIL HONORS ITS LATE MAYOR

In a special meeting Tuesday evening, the Shaker Heights Council paid homage to the memory of William J. Van Aken.

"There is nothing that any of us can say that has not been said but we wish to give formal recognition of our loss," said Mayor John W. Barkley.

He asked Clerk Thomas E. Cook to read the following statement for insertion in the minutes of the meeting:

The death of William J. Van Aken has taken from us not only an honored neighbor and beloved friend but also one of that little group of men to whom we owe the Shaker Heights we know today.

To those of us who have had the privilege of working with him at City Hall through the years, his passing is an especial loss.

Mayor Van Aken guided this community safely through its transition period from its earliest beginnings as a real estate project to its maturity as one of the finest residential suburbs.

We owe him a debt we cannot repay.

We at City Hall join all of Shaker Heights in heartfelt sympathy to Mrs. Van Aken and her family and are sharing the sorrow which they are called upon to endure.

Mayor Barkley, visibly touched, spoke in the audience to those in the audience who also are touched.

MOVE TO CHANGE S. MORELAND TO VAN AKEN BLVD.

Councilwoman Mary K. Retak informed The Sun last night she would oppose any attempt in Cleveland Council to change South Moreland to Van Aken Blvd. The short stretch from South Woodland to Shaker Square lies in her ward in Cleveland. She reported "tremendous opposition" from merchants on South Moreland and from apartment residents there. The merchants, she said, protested the hardship of re-establishing their location.

Mayor John W. Barkley said Monday that there had been no opposition voiced to the renaming of South Moreland Blvd. in Shaker Heights to Van Aken Blvd. in memory of the late William J. Van Aken, mayor of Shaker for 35 years.

The renaming proposal, approved by the Shaker Council, was first announced at the conclusion of a memorial service for the late mayor at Plymouth Church, Sunday afternoon.

Mayor Barkley, who presided at the service, told the audience of 600 that filled the main hall, that the Shaker council's memorial committee had agreed to the renaming of South Moreland Blvd. The change was appropriate, he said, "because it ran past City Hall where Mayor Van Aken served so well and alongside the rapid transit line whose acquisition by the city he considered his greatest achievement."

Law Director Ralph W. Jones was conferring this week with county officials as to the legal steps required to change the name. Except for the short stretch from South Woodland to Shaker Square, which is in Cleveland, South Moreland lies entirely within Shaker Heights. Portions of it, however, are designated county highway.

Changing of the name of the street will mean changing the South Moreland Division of the Shaker Rapid Transit line to the Van Aken Division, which was a prime consideration in selecting South Moreland, Mayor Barkley said.

Mayor Barkley also announced that a permanent memorial plaque would be erected at City Hall and that a large portrait photograph of the late mayor now greets the first floor landing at the hall.

H. Walter Stewart, chairman of the board of managers of the Heights Y. M. C. A., in relating the work of the mayor towards constructing the new Heights Y building, said a permanent room in the structure would be named after the mayor. Mayor Van Aken was a member of the board of trustees of the Heights Y and instrumental in securing the building site on Lee Rd. in Cleveland Heights.

Speakers at the services praised the mayor not only for his outstanding record of public service but also for his personal integrity and good heart. He was informed Shaker police and firemen, Regimental Band, and a military band formed an honorary cortege at the hour-long service of impressive dignity.

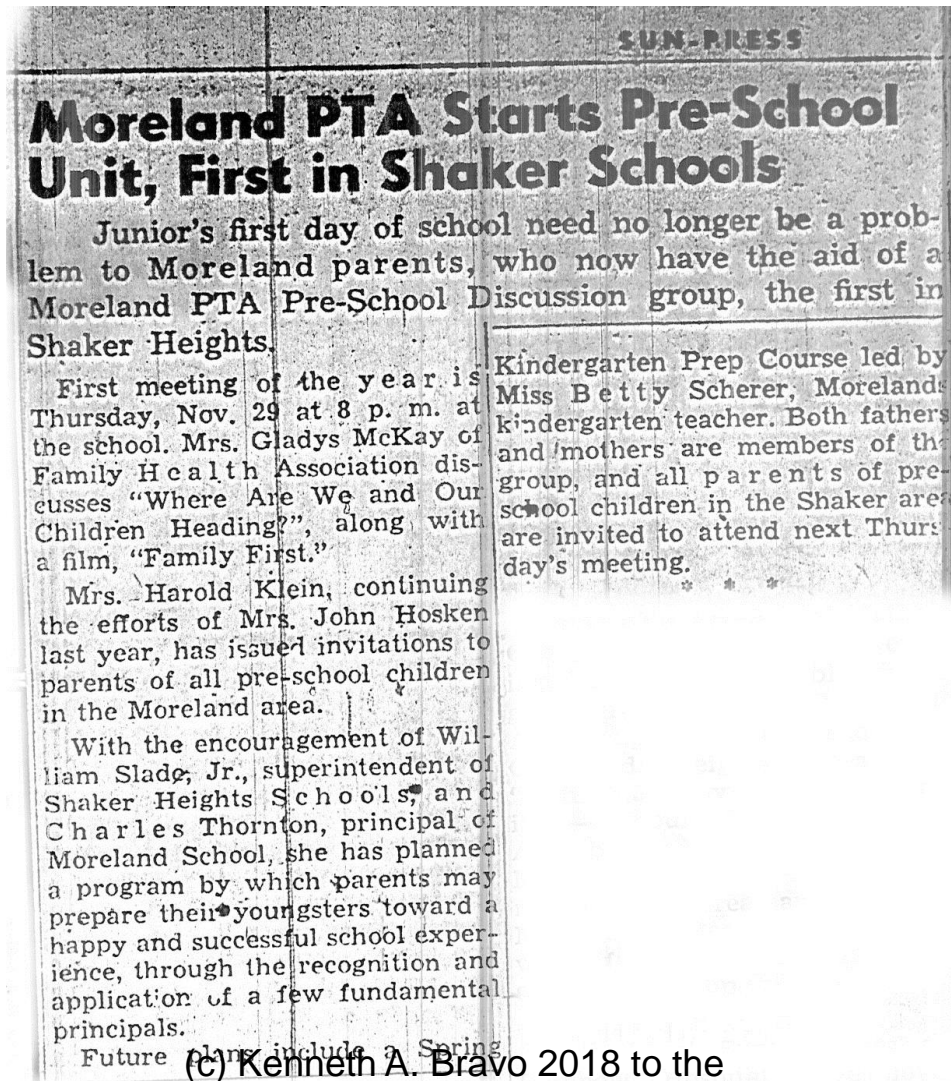

New Elementary School Is Approved in Shaker

The Shaker Heights School Board, which has never lost a sponsored school bond issue, scored another smashing victory when 82 per cent of the voters in the Shaker School District approved a \$1,750,000 bond issue for an expansion program in the Shaker schools. A 55 per cent majority was required.

Incomplete returns gave 7,172 for the bonds and 1,605 against. Clerk-Treasurer J. W. Main said the results were better than expected. The last school bond issue was approved by a 78 per cent majority.

Mr. Main said that the plans for the expansion program, which includes a new \$1,000,000 elementary school on Mercer Rd. in the Green Rd.-Shaker Blvd. area, will now be completed as rapidly as possible and application for-

warded for the required steel to Washington. Of the balance, \$300,000 will be used to provide Shaker High with two music wings; \$200,000 will be used to modernize school lighting, and \$250,000 for new furniture and furniture replacement.

Rufus S. Day, Jr., president of the school board, and his running mate, Alexander Mintz, president of Shaker Savings, won the two school board posts easily. Both were backed by the Shaker

Citizen's Committee which has endorsed and supported school board candidates for 25 years. Incomplete returns gave Day, 6,577; Mintz, 5,060, and Theodore Wohl, who ran as an independent, 2,057. Terms are for four years at no salary. Five members constitute the board.

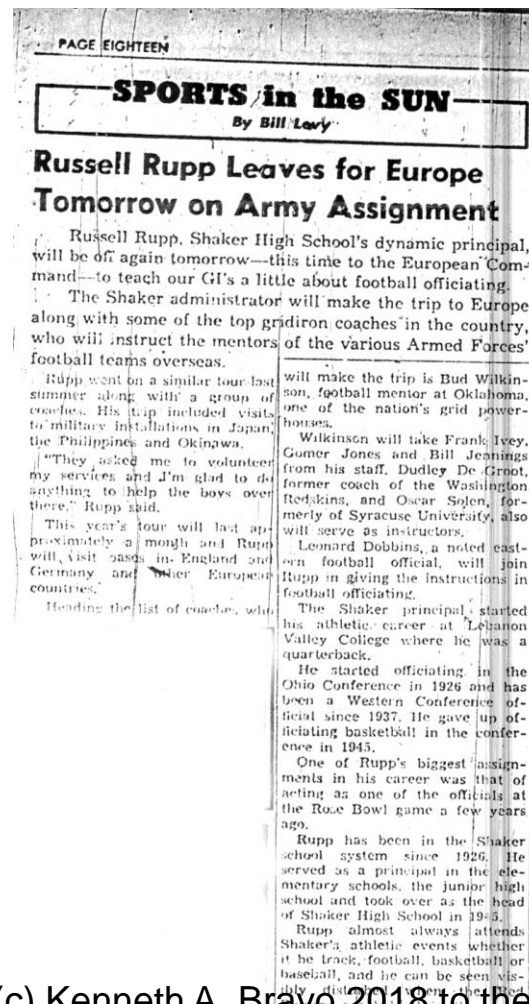

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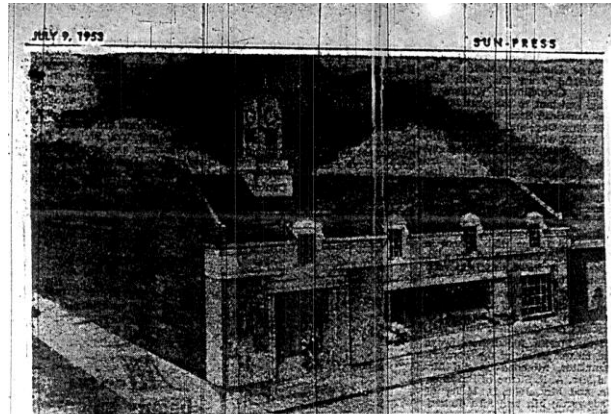

Over the summer, Shaker Savings moved into its new home on Kinsman



The new home which Shaker Savings Association will move into at 16800 Kinsman Rd., S.H., this November will faithfully reflect the colonial atmosphere so long a tradition in Shaker Heights. Exterior design is simplified Georgian Colonial. An illuminated three-faced clock tower to be built on the roof over the entrance will chime every quarter hour.

Contracts will be let and alterations will begin this coming week on new and expanded quarters for the Shaker Savings Association in the one-story building at 16800 Kinsman Rd., S.H., formerly occupied by the Fisher Bros. Co. Completion date is Nov. 1.

The one-story building was bought from the Cleveland Trust Co., as trustees of the John Sal-

mon estate, for approximately \$100,000, according to Alexander Mintz, president of the savings and loan association.

The one-story building directly adjoins the present offices of the association. The building has 88 feet frontage on Kinsman Rd. and a depth of 200 feet.

When completed, the new quarters will provide Shaker Savings with 2½ times its present space or some 7,000 square feet of working area, free of columns, and all on one floor. Total investment of the Association in the expansion, when remodeling is completed, has been estimated by Mr. Mintz at approximately \$250,000.

Under the direction of George Howard Burrows, Hinman and Gabriel, architects, the building will be given a new exterior in the classical colonial tradition. The interior, completely air conditioned and acoustically treated, will be so arranged that all operations of the Association can be conducted on one floor. There will be eight teller stations as

against four in its present quarters, and the building will be carpeted throughout.

Mrs. Caroline Piercy, an outstanding local authority on Shaker tradition and a trustee of the Shaker Historical Society, will participate in consultations to assure that the interior decor will faithfully reflect the Shaker tradition.

Mr. Mintz said. An outstanding feature of the new quarters will be a civic or community meeting room, also on the main floor, which will accommodate approximately 100 people. It will have a private entrance from a 100-car parking area immediately to the rear of the building and will be available to civic and community groups active in the Shaker Heights area. Shaker Savings Association has occupied its present quarters at 16808 Kinsman Rd. since 1938. It also maintains a branch at 13109 Shaker Square, which will be continued.

The Association reports assets of over \$18,000,000. Mr. Mintz is also a member of the Shaker School Board. William A. Kellner is secretary of the company. Directors of the Association are Judge Edward Blythin, Chairman of the board; William Greenbaum, Ray Shimmion, Miss Lota Kelly; Leonard Church and Rodney Up-right.

The Association has just increased its interest rate to 2½ per cent, effective July 1. In addition to its savings and mortgage department, the Shaker Savings Association is an authorized agent for the collection of utility bills and the redemption of savings bonds. It is also a successful operation of a savings institution.

Eye Shaker's Last Farm For Site of Junior High

A 10-acre farm—the only one in Shaker Heights and unknown to most Shaker residents—is the probable site of Shaker's second junior high school.

Business Manager J. W. Main said the school board was now in the process of selecting an architect for the second junior high and that Superintendent of Schools, William Slade Jr., was gathering information as to latest in junior high courses of study. A bond issue for the junior high, amount as yet undetermined, is scheduled for the November ballot, Main said.

Shaker's lone junior high at South Woodland and Woodbury Rds. was built for 900 and last year 1060 attended. Enrollment this fall is estimated at 1200 with a 1500 enrollment seen in the next few years. The new junior high, Main said, will house some 900 pupils, relieving the present junior high and providing for future expansion.

Owners of the choice tract east

of Warrensville Center Rd. and south of Shaker Blvd., are the taciturn Malecek brothers, John and Anton, who have farmed the land for 47 years and have no thought of stopping now.

Since the Maleceks bought the acreage in 1906, they have stubbornly rejected scores of offers by realtors who want to divide it into single home lots that today would sell for \$3,000 each. The bachelor brothers built their own home in 1907 that still stands at 2869 Warrensville Center Rd., but today Fayette Rd. cuts across the western end of the property, separating the house from the farm.

The Maleceks, who once operated a 40-acre truck farm in Mantua, O., say working their 10 acres is "just exercise." But their

Two-Million Gallon Tank and New Mains to Ease Water Shortages

Says Serious Droughts Ended for Far Suburbs

By Marion Kelly

Relief from water shortages that have plagued the eastern suburbs for years is in sight this summer, Frank J. Schwenler, commissioner of water for the City of Cleveland, said today.

The construction of a 2,000,000-gallon water tank on Kinsman Rd., east of Green Rd. in Beachwood, combined with the construction of new water mains on Cedar and Lander Rds., all scheduled for completion by June 1, will improve the water supply substantially, Schwenler said.

In recent dry summers, the third high service area (the eastern section of the county, about a 500-foot elevation) has been so seriously affected that several suburbs have not had water to fight fires, and many homes were completely without water at various hours of the day.

Suburbs affected are the eastern edge of Shaker Heights, Beachwood, Gates Mills, Mayfield Heights, Peiper Pike-Woodmere, Orange Village, and parts of Hunting Valley, Warrensville Township, Warrensville Heights, Moreland Hills and Solon.

"We will have to have some cooperation on the part of the users," Schwenler said. "There will have to be some reasonable limitation of sprinkling in excess." (Continued on Page 6)

Like the stem of a giant flower, the two-million gallon water tank has mushroomed out of the earth to dominate the landscape at Kinsman Rd. and Green Rd. in Beachwood. When completed this summer, it will ease the water shortages that have plagued the eastern suburbs.

Milking cows is a far cry from teaching chemistry—but that's how educator Charles A. Thornton got his start.

Mr. Recreation Quits in Shaker

Mr. Recreation of Shaker Heights is going to retire this month.

He is Charles A. Thornton, recreation director for the schools and city for 37 years. "Charlie," is going to devote his time from now on to lighter recreation—reading and playing bridge.

Thornton joined the Shaker Heights school system in 1921. Two years later he inaugurated the suburb's first supervised playground program.

Staff Now 150

The retiring director said he has seen his recreation program grow from 50 children directed by four members at two schools to a program in which more than 3,000 youngsters participate at eight schools under supervision of 159 persons.

Thornton has stressed tennis, swimming and badminton because those sports can be carried over to adult life.

His interest in recreation began at Albion College. He taught physical education and coached the basketball team there.

"Play As You Go" Plan

The genial director will be well remembered for his "Play As You Go" recreational operation in the mid-thirties when lack of funds caused the Shaker school system to withdraw its support.

Thornton pointed out that residents needed recreational facilities more than ever during the depression years. He started a program that enabled children to play on playgrounds after school, not only in the

on a weekly or seasonal basis. His plan worked.

Park Honors Him

The retiring director feels he was honored as anyone could ever hope to be when a park in Shaker Heights off Helen Road and east of Warrensville Center Road was named for him recently.

The couple have a daughter, Mrs. Donna Hunsdorf who lives with her three children and husband, Paul, in Honolulu. Her husband is a Hawaiian Air Lines pilot.

When "Mr. Recreation" retired, he recalled that in 1923, two years after he joined the Shaker school system as a teacher, he inaugurated the city's first supervised playground program. He saw it grow under his direction from 50 children, supervised by four people at two schools, to a program in which more than 3000 youngsters took part in eight schools, under supervision of 159.

During the 1930's he inaugurated a "Pay as you go" plan to compensate for lack of operating funds.

From 1921 to 1928 Mr. Thornton taught chemistry, physics and biology at Shaker High and from 1928 to 1933 he was assistant principal there. He was named Moreland School principal in 1933 and from 1941 to 1951 he headed both Moreland and Fernway Schools. He then became full-time supervisor and director of recreation for the City of Shaker Heights and its Board of Education.

In Shaker he was active in the American Legion and in Rotary and he continued these interests in Hawaii. He and his wife moved to Hawaii to be near their daughter, Mrs. Paul Hundsdorf, and her family.
